# Colorado Wing Cadet Serving as Chair of National Cadet Advisory Council (CAC)

Cadet Lieutenant Colonel Cooper Eisman from the Valkyrie Cadet Squadron is the Chair of the Civil Air Patrol's National Cadet Advisory Council (NCAC.) As the NCAC Chair, he works to advise the National Commander and the National Cadet Team on matters important to CAP's Cadet Corps.

I asked Cadet Eisman about NCAC and what it is like to serve as the NCAC Chair.

#### 1) What is your job? What is it like to be the NCAC Chair?

C/Lt. Col Cooper Eisman's Response: The National Cadet Advisory Council represents the diverse interests, passions, and concerns of all 25,000 Civil Air Patrol Cadets. In fulfilling its duties, the NCAC advises the National Commander and National Cadet Team on matters important to our Cadet Corps. The council consists of eighteen senior cadets: two representatives from each region of CAP, a vice-chair, and a chair.

At any level of leadership in a committee, I have found that the strongest leaders have a distinct aptitude toward traits that are generally associated with servant leadership. I like to think of the position of the chair as being largely centered around the coordination of people, organization of tasks, and maintenance of esprit de corps. I work closely with the vice-chair -- C/Lt Col Rodrick Zapanta -- to support the representatives in their work; facilitating the best conditions for successful outcomes.

The NCAC team this year is full of intelligent, diligent, and dedicated members. I am beyond honored that I was given the opportunity to work alongside these outstanding individuals to introduce important changes to the Cadet Program. I am proud to represent our Cadet Corps.

#### 2) How have Region CAC and Wing CAC prepared you for National CAC?

C/Lt. Col Cooper Eisman's Response: I have been in the Cadet Advisory Council Program for roughly 5 years now. Back when I had just joined the Civil Air Patrol, I was doing some research online when I found out about the Cadet Advisory Council Program. At the next squadron meeting, I asked my Unit Commander and was appointed to the position of Assistant Representative to the Wing CAC the next day. Since then, I have served as the Primary Representative from Valkyrie Cadet Squadron to the Wing, Colorado Wing Recorder, RMR Assistant Representative from Colorado, RMR CAC Recorder, and Rocky Mountain Region CAC Vice-Chair.

At each level, I have found that my peers and mentors have pushed me to work harder, to develop discipline in my work, and to constantly focus on becoming better than I was yesterday. So, I would say that my experiences not only prepared me for the position but that my peers pushed me to work for and earn the position I am currently in.
