As I mentioned in my last article, I was a Boy Scout. Their slogan is "Do a good turn daily." One of the twelve points in the Scout Law is that a Boy Scout is Helpful. It was a massive effort which provided most members with the opportunity to service their neighbors. This was the biggest mission in CAP's History.

These services are our Threefold Mission of Aerospace Education, Emergency Services, and Cadet Programs. With COVID restictions and guidelines, there were some very interesting challenges which were met and overcome.
